Tires were off one front and one rear wheel, and it was loaded down with luggage including full equipment for camping, until it appeared it could not possibly carry another pound of weight. To let the gas accumulate and come up through the jet, wooden plugs are removed from the sides of the pipe, allowing the water to thus escape. The gas coming thru the jet burns steadily, making a flame approximately eight inches high. It burns clean, leaving no deposit. The cone of the flame is blue, with a red fringe.

Near the site of the well is the graveyard of pioneers who gave their lives in an Indian attack in the early days, marking which is a memorial placed there in 1926 by Daughters of the American Revolution and the Pioneers' Association of Polk county. Colonel Cornelius Gilliam, uncle of Frank Gilliam of this city, is among the victims memorialized.

With the shoot half over, Heppner-Pilot Rock is assured a place in the final shoot-off, being well up in the percentage column, while it is impossible for the combination to place first in the telegraphic fray.
