

TURKEY GROWING IN GOOD CONDITION

Success of Cooperative
Told Lions by Doug-
las County Man.

COACH CITES TEAM

Football Boys Shaping Up Well for
Pendleton Game; State Chamber
Secretary Coming Monday.

Success attained by the North-west Turkeygrowers Cooperative Marketing association is indicative of what might be accomplished in the marketing of other farm products, notably lambs, McKinley Huntington, Douglas county turkey grower and officer of the association, told Heppner Lions at their Monday luncheon. The association's success was attributed to the coordination of cooperative agencies through the Federal Farm Board set-up, systematic market reports by means of which unnecessary expense of distribution was eliminated, and standardizing the manner of marketing the birds so as to get them to the consumer in the best possible condition.

Mr. Huntington said a like method of killing and dressing lambs before putting them on the market might well be considered by sheepmen.

Turkeys are one of very few farm commodities that are paying a fair return on investment this year, he said. And the nice part of it is they bring cash return on delivery.

Mr. Huntington does not fear an overproduction of turkeys this year. While production in Oregon has increased 15 per cent this year, Texas, which produces more turkeys than all other states combined, has declined 10 per cent, and the entire Oregon production will not equal the shortage of the Texas crop.

The turkey specialist, who has been retained by the U. S. department of agriculture extension service, spoke to the Lions following a field demonstration at the Harold Rankin farm on Rhea creek in the morning. He was accompanied by Garnet Best, assistant county agent of Umatilla county, and together they went to Boardman for another field demonstration that afternoon.

To let the county know how it felt on the matter, the club went on record favoring the court using money from the county emergency fund for the purpose of paying labor for cutting wood and digging potatoes which may be needed to meet the unemployment situation in the county this winter.

Neil Shurman, high school athletic coach, appeared before the club, citing the good record made by the H. H. S. football team so far this season, and stressing the importance of the game with Pendleton high's first team here a week from the coming Saturday. He also urged attendance at the game with Arlington here today.

In the first game Heppner lost to Hermiston, but has since won from Lexington, Pilot Rock and Athena. The latter game, played Saturday, ended in a 20-0 score. Pendleton beat Athena 23-0. According to dope, therefore, the local lads should have a good chance of downing the heavy lads from the Umatilla county seat. At least they are working hard to this end, said the coach. The last game of the season will be played here against Hermiston on Armistice Day, and the coach expects his lads will retaliate their former defeat.

Announcement was made of the dinner being given Monday by the Heppner Rod and Gun club, at which H. L. Kelly, state game supervisor, will speak on the "Ten Year Plan" of game conservation in Oregon.

A large majority of Lions present signified their intention of attending. An open invitation to attend was extended to anyone interested.

Acceptance of an invitation by W. G. Ide, secretary of the state chamber of commerce, to attend the meeting of the club next Monday, was read by Al Rankin, Morrow county director of the state chamber.

One minute of silence was observed in honor of Thomas A. Edison, news of whose death was received in the papers that morning.

Family Puts Up 1100 Jars Fruits, Vegetables, Meats

Eleven hundred jars of home canned foods in the cellar closet for a cash investment of \$25 is the achievement of Mrs. J. B. Ohler and her daughter, Mrs. H. M. Egan of Kist. Some of these 1100 containers are pint jars, others are quart sizes and still others half gallon ones. The large quantities, Mrs. Ohler explains, are for the company dinners of 15 to 25 persons she serves frequently throughout the year.

The canned foods include many vegetables such as peas, beans, vegetable stew, tomatoes, baby carrots, baby beets, greens; small fruits including berries, cherries, apricots, peaches and apple sauce; and such meats as beef, veal and chicken. Apple juice for apple jelly making was put up in sterilized bottles of various shapes.

In the Ohler-Egan root cellar are stored quantities of squash, potatoes, turnips, carrots, parsnips and cabbage. This food preservation interest grew out of the year round garden project undertaken by a number of Columbia county women and carried on under the direction of Mrs. Sarah Case, home demonstration agent. The \$25 outlay for the 1100 cans of food covered all costs except those for labor and fuel.

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ITES HELD FOR THOS. A. DRISKELL

Former Resident, Father of Mrs. Glen Hayes, Succumbs at La Grande Following Illness.

Funeral services for Thomas A. Driskell, 75, former Morrow county resident who died at La Grande, Sunday, were held at the Methodist church in this city Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Glen P. White officiating. Interment was in Masonic cemetery beside his wife, Mary Stone Driskell, who preceded him in death. The funeral was largely attended by relatives and friends, and the floral offerings were many and beautiful.

Mr. Driskell died at the home of a son following a lingering illness, with all the children present at the bedside.

Thomas A. Driskell was born in Iowa in 1856, and departed this life at La Grande, Oregon, October 18, 1931, aged 75 years. He married Mary E. Stone in 1879, and to this union eight children were born, all of whom survive but one who died in infancy. The surviving children are William M. and George F. of La Grande; Elsie A. of The Dalles; Thomas C., Hubert H. and Lillie May of Portland, and Verna V. of Heppner. His wife preceded him in death nine years ago. In 1918 he was again married, to Phoebe Harlan of Weiser, Idaho. She survives besides four stepchildren, 22 grandchildren and one great grandchild.

With his family Mr. Driskell farmed for a number of years in Clarks canyon in this county, and later moved to Heppner, during his residence here being occupied as travelling meat vender. He later moved to La Grande where he had resided for several years.

He was a Methodist nearly all his life.

Money-Making Turkey Pointers Demonstrated to Local Growers

"Don't market your turkeys until they are ready," is the advice given by a group of turkey growers assembled at the Harold Rankin farm on Rhea creek Monday morning, by McKinley Huntington, veteran turkey grower of Douglas county, in the course of a demonstration showing the selection, sticking, and other fine points of growing and preparing the birds for market. He said that he had learned through years of experience that it does not pay to watch market reports, as the dealers always attempt to get the birds into their hands early for speculation. The real market never develops until about three days before the holiday. By paying attention to the birds and getting them on the market in prime condition, the premium received invariably more than compensates the grower no matter what the market.

There are many little points in the preparation of turkeys for market which are easily overlooked, but which should be given attention if the birds are to get a premium price, said Mr. Huntington. "Turkeys are susceptible to light and if penned up in a lighted enclosure will mill around and pile up, causing injury to some of the birds. But if the enclosure is darkened they will remain quiet." He advised covering the sides of the pens with gunny sacks when the birds are to be caught, allowing no light beams into the pen as even the light thru a knot hole will distract the birds. The catching cage also should be darkened.

He advised that a single section of the catching cage should not be more than six feet in length, with the lid not more than four feet, so that when one reaches in after a bird he covers the hole completely enough that there is little chance for a bird to jump out beside him. The bird, in being caught from the cage should be grabbed by both legs, as it will then offer little resistance, whereas if caught by only one leg it will attempt to free itself and possibly break a wing or otherwise injure itself. Everything possible should be done to keep from unduly exciting the birds.

Birds which are not ready should not be killed, he said. It is simple to tell when they are ready. The main points to be ascertained are if the bird is properly meated and if the feathers are developed as they should be. The meat on the breast is the best indication of the first condition. With a little experience one can tell immediately by running the open hand along the breast whether the meat is there.

Then an examination of the base of the long feathers and of the pin feathers will tell whether the blood is out of the feathers and whether the pin feathers have grown out sufficiently for picking. When the base of the feathers is blue the blood is still in them and they do not pluck easily. When the birds are right, the base of the feathers is white, and the skin is a creamy white. The pin feathers should be blossomed, for the easiest way to get the pin feathers out is to grow them out, Mr. Huntington said.

In case the birds are not fattening properly, though proper rations are being given, it is well to examine the scales on the legs for mites. If mites are present in the flock they will be found under the leg scales, and if found, immediate steps for eradication should be taken. Mites and lice on the birds make them fret and keep them from developing properly.

Mr. Huntington's method of handling the bird to be killed was to tie a string around the legs at the time of catching, leaving a short loop in the end by which to hang the bird after it has been plucked. He demonstrated a simple stringing device of his own invention. Taking an ordinary fire brick, he fastened one end of a heavy, stiff wire, about 2 1/2 feet in length, around the middle, making a groove around the brick for the wire to fit into and fastening the wire quite tight. On the other end he made a sharpened hook with the sharp end and projecting outward, and bent over toward the brick, to hang from the lower jaw of the bird after it had been stuck. A few inches below the hook, he made a loop in the wire to keep the hand from sliding into the hook after the wire had become slick from blood. A fire brick is just the proper weight, about 4 pounds, and the implement devised is very handy for when not in use it can be set down flat with the wire sticking up in easy reach, and to be easily found.

To hang the bird up for sticking, Mr. Huntington used a light rope, hung from a cross beam, with a short, round stick in the end. This stick was slipped under the cord between the legs of the bird. Simple and inexpensive, these devices were demonstrated to serve their purpose well.

In sticking the bird, he used an ordinary turkey-sticking knife, the main requirements of which are a slender, stiff, sharp blade, long enough to reach well back into the bird's throat. There are two jugular veins in a turkey's throat, one on either side, which come together in a V-shaped ridge in the back of the mouth, he explained. That the bird may bleed properly it is necessary to sever both of these veins. Running the knife into the bird's mouth at an angle across the head, he severed each of the veins separately. The increased blood flow indicates when the second vein has been cut, and by cutting in this manner, one may be sure that both veins have been severed. To kill the bird, the knife was then run into the forepart of the brain, piercing the knife under one eye diagonally across the head to the opposite ear. The turkey's brain is small, and sets well back in the head, he explained. The forepart of the brain is pierced because it results in slower death and longer heart action which is desired.

"The Ten Year Plan" of game conservation in Oregon, which, if carried through to a successful conclusion, will add \$10,000,000 to the annual revenue of the state, in the opinion of its sponsor, H. L. Kelly, state game supervisor, will be explained at a dinner next Monday evening by Mr. Kelly. The dinner, sponsored by Heppner Rod and Gun club, will be held at 6:30 o'clock at the Episcopal parish house. It is open to the public, and all interested are urged to attend. A charge of 50 cents a plate will be made for the dinner.

Accompanying Mr. Kelly will be Vic Bracher of Pilot Rock, who will show moving pictures of game life. These pictures are entirely different from those shown at the game banquet two years ago, says Russell E. Pratt, gun club secretary, in charge of plans for the meeting.
