In the wake of every great war since a record has been kept of man's activity on earth, there has come a period of business stagnation featured by a lowering of standards in all lines of human endeavor. During these periods few works of literature or art of lasting quality have been produced, and advancements made in the few pure sciences. Classic of all such periods in history, when man's ac-complishments were at the lowest ebb at any time since the beginnings of civilization, is the Dark Ages, following in the wake of the invasions of King Attilus and his Huns and the downfall of the Roman Empire. History is so void of record of any progress in human endeavor during this period that the ensuing era has been termed the Rennalssance, or revival of learning.

Space does not permit of a discussion of all the contributing factors which brought about these past periods, had the writer the knowledge. But it is the generally accepted belief that a repetition of them with lesser force, due to accumulated lessons of civilization, has taken place when contributing factors were similar.

Our institutions of higher educa-

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

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
