Lesson for September 18: The Reports of the Spies Numbers 13 and 14 Golden Text: Psalm 27:1

The Israelites were now in the wilderness of Paran, when Moses is commanded by the Lord to select twelve men, one from each tribe, to make a tour of inspection of the promised land. Thus was inaugurated one of the earliest geographical expeditions in history, scouts made a thorough investigation of both the land's fertile areas and its barren wastes.
