A NEW WAVE OF LAWLESSNESS.

THE recent epidemic of kidnapping seems to us to be a direct outgrowth of the lawlessness which was bred under the prohibition laws. Thousands of men found it easy to make big money quickly by violating the liquor laws. Now that there is no longer a profit in illicit beer running, and the indications are that the prohibition amendment will be repealed in its entirety, these "easy-money" gentry are turning to another and even more vicious sort of racket.

We have not the complete record before us, but since the tragic Lindbergh baby case there have been at least twenty and probably more cases of kidnapping for reward, and something like a million dollars, or even more, has been paid to these criminals for the safe return of their victims. Only in few cases has there been any such prompt action on the part of the authorities as to serve as a warn-

ing that kidnapping is unprofitable One of the worst features of kidnapping is that the friends and relatives of the victim generally do ot notify the police or the sheriff. They have been warned not to so, on penalty of the death of the person who has been kidnapped. For, in nine cases out of ten, the kidnappers are utterly lawless in-dividuals or gangs, who would not
