A GOOD REASON TO VOTE. WHILE there is little in the political situation to evoke unusual interest at the polls on May 18, there are some important offices for which to select men and some important measures to be voted upon. This newspaper has no desire to attempt to dictate the vote of anyone in any instance, but it would like to emphasize the importance of everyone exercising his right of franchise who has the privilege of doing so. Only through an active electorate can a true expression of

the desires of the people be given. There is good reason for the re-publicans of Morrow county taking an active interest at this election, however. It is the opportun-ity which is afforded to promote an eastern Oregon man to a position on the state board of control.

Eastern Oregon does have such representation at the present time, since the appointment of P. J. Stadelman to the office of secretary of state. But Mr. Stadelman is not seeking reelection, and the only eastern Oregon candidate in the field, in either the republican or democratic ranks, is Earl W. Snell of Arlington. It appears that only through support of Mr. Snell can eastern Oregon hope to have a representative on the state's control body after next November. At this writing all indications point to the selection of a governor from the other side of the mountains.

That Mr. Snell would fill the po sition of secretary of state worthily and do credit to his section of the state is indicated by his excellent record in the house of representatives which resulted in his being raised to the speakership. His work in the latter capacity is re-cent history, and shows Mr. Snell to have a broad conception of the functioning of state government as a whole, as well as a sympathetic interest in the needs of his section.

As speaker, Mr. Snell drew the of state attention which caused him to be mentioned several times as a likely gubernatorial prospect. He settled upon the race for secretary of state, however, believing that his capabilities at this time were better suited to serve his state in that office.

Pursuant to the conditions of my contract with you, I have made an audit of records and accounts of the County Clerk, Mr. Gay M. Anderson, the County Sheriff, Mr. C. J. D. Bauman, the County Treasurer, Mr. L. W. Briggs, and the County Assessor, Mr. J. J. Wells, from January 1, 1932 to December 31, 1932.

Sheriff's Office. Tax Collections.

There was the sum of \$14,176.20 on hand on December 31, 1931, and the collections during the year of 1932 was \$220,494.20, or a total of tax collections of \$234,670.40. Of this amount the sum of \$5,780,03 was collected as penalty and interest. There was turned over to the Gounty Treasurer on the tax collection account the sum of \$234,644.97, or an over-remittance of \$174.57. Of this amount of \$174.57 the sum of \$174.57 was corrected by the tax collection department in the 1933 collections, and as explained on the report of the account of C. J. D. 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
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
