County Court met Dec. 5, 1934, and had the following: Request was made of the Highway Commission to complete the fill just north of Hardman.

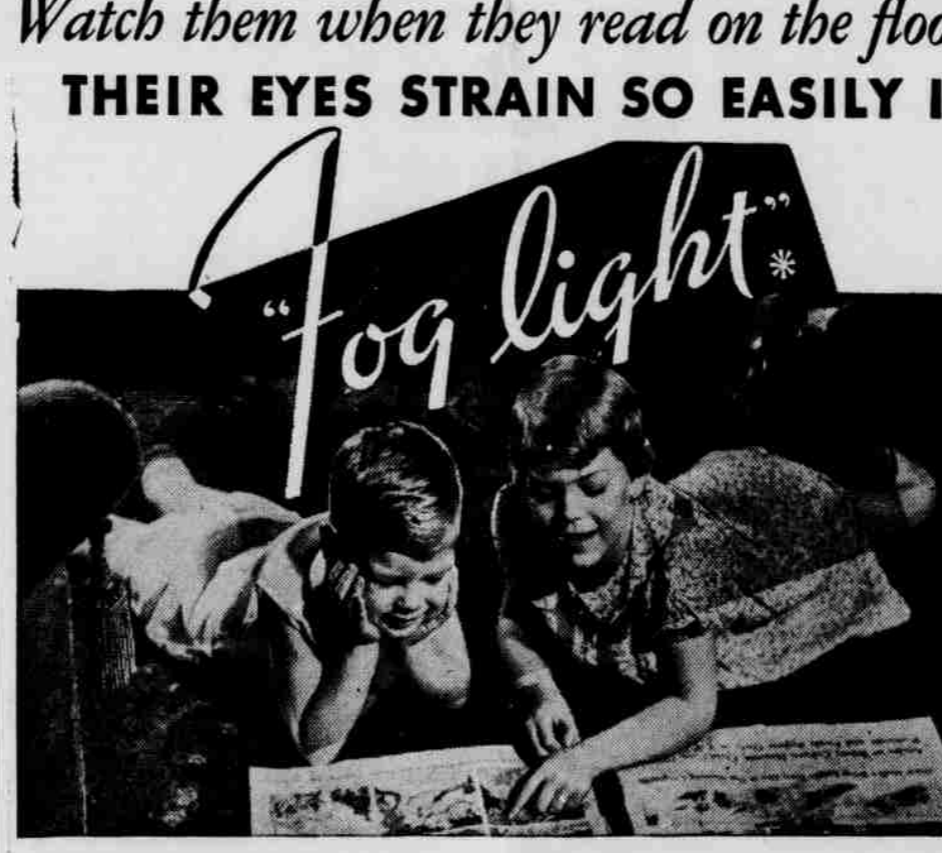
