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

Washington . . . distance

Many years ago someone called Washington "the city of maginficent distances," and the appellation has stuck. I was again reminded of it last week, when on a trip to the Nation's capital I had to call at a dozen or more Federal offices.

Washington is more like the great European cities than any other American municipality. Its growth has been horizontal instead of vertical. About the tallest building in the city is the National Press Club, and that is only 13 stories. Most of the Government buildings are

under six stories high. It is not at all uncommon to have travel three or four miles, or farther, to get from one Government building to another, and in the course of a day around Federal offices the visitor has to walk along literally miles of corridors.

It occurred to me that one of the reasons why Government business takes so long to transact may be the time and energy wasted in get-ting from one office to another. Washington is not geared up to speed and efficiency.

Beauty in marble

Major L'Enfant, the brilliant Frenchman who planned the Fed-eral city, conceived it as the most beautiful city in the world. It seems more beautiful every time I visit is -and I've known Washington since 1881. In another fifty years there will be nothing to compare with it for beauty.
