At the Drop of the Hat.

ROOSEVELT'S acceptance speech at Philadelphia, Saturday, was the "drop of the hat" which started what should be the greatest race ever staged for the presidency of the United States.

Probably no presidential candidate ever received such an ovation as Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Farley caused to be staged for Mr. Roosevelt in the Quaker city, and caused to be staged simultaneously all over the country. The man from Hyde park was talked of in superlatives by many orators, and the customary Roosevelt smile beamed approval. The smoothly oiled machinery of the democratic national convention permitted no discordant notes; rang the welkin of unified Rooseveltian cheer. As was expected, all permitted to speak pointed with pride at everything good in the world and laid all shortcomings at the door of the republican predecessors in office.

Nothing was said about the democratic congress and other democrats who heckled President Hoover and made many things he attempted to accomplish for the public good fall short of their purpose. At the door of John N. Garner, democratic candidate for vice president, was not laid his action under Hoover which caused all application for help under Reconstruction Finance corporation to be publicized and thus keep that most effective agency since the New Deal began from being of benefit so long as the former administration was in office, and which did more than any other one thing to force banks to the wall.

"We have brought you thus far; you cannot go on without us." That in effect, was all the democrats said at Philadelphia. Not mentioned were the broken pledges of the campaign of 1932, except for reiterating them in the hope of a favorable effect upon a gullible public.

In making a show at Philadelphia in which he might play the role of a hero, Roosevelt evidenced the same tendencies of dictatorship which were shown when he asked congress for extra-constitutional powers which, in effect, were a delegation of the powers of congress to the executive. As indicated by Hoover's speech at Cleveland the Roosevelt tactics are parallel with those accompanying the establishment of Mussolini and Hitler as dictators across the seas. The self-styled protectors of liberty have ravaged the safeguards of constitutional government under which this country became the greatest nation on earth. Their promises before were broken. Yet they ask the American people to continue to entrust the nation's destiny in their hands.

The teaching profession is romantic. Coincident with announcement of the National Education association convention in Portland, there appeared in the daily press in front page position announcement of the marriage of a 49-year-old teacher to a former pupil, 20 years old.
