Rural roads present special hazards after dark, warns the Oregon State Motor association. Wear light colored clothes, or better still, carry a light when walking at night.

Spoiled Legume Hay Valuable Fertilizer

Legume hay, such as alfalfa and clover, that has been spoiled by the recent rains may be salvaged for use as fertilizer, says Dr. W. L. Powers, chief of the soils department at Oregon State college. He points out that a ton of alfalfa contains about 40 pounds of nitrogen, which in fertilizer, would cost as much as 10c a pound. It also contains about 25 pounds of potassium and 7 pounds of phosphorus.
This spoiled legume hay makes a valuable mulch, checking evaporation and loss of soil moisture, and because of its favorable nitrogen content for decomposition, does not depress growth, Dr. Powers says.
When applied in orchards at the rate of two tons of dry material per acre it will also earn soil conservation payments under the 1937 soil conservation program. It is best to remove the spoiled crop from the fields promptly, he says, and if it is not applied immediately to place it in ricks for later use as fertilizer.

SPEED STILL GREATEST RISK

Excessive speed again leads the list of causes of automobile fatalities in Oregon, notes the Oregon State Motor association. Drivers flouting the speed laws last month here precipitated 574 accidents, four deaths.

NOTICE IS GIVEN that a special election will be held in the City of Heppner, Oregon, on Wednesday, the 14th day of July, 1937. The purpose of said election is to vote on a proposed charter amendment as in the following resolution provided:

RESOLUTION
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEPPNER, MORGAN COUNTY, STATE OF OREGON, that the following proposed amendments to the charter of said City be and the same hereby are proposed for submission to the legal voters of said City for their adoption or rejection at the special city election to be held on the 14th day of July, 1937, as in this resolution provided:

CHARTER AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COMMON COUNCIL.

AN ACT
To amend the charter of the City of Heppner, Oregon, enacted by the legal voters on December 20, 1918, and to amend all amendments to said Charter enacted by the legislative assembly or by vote of the people.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF HEPPNER, OREGON, that

The Charter of the City of Heppner, Oregon, enacted by the legal voters on December 2, 1918, as amended by all amendments thereto enacted by the legislative assembly or by vote of the people, be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto Chapter..... to read as follows:

Chapter
Section 1. The Common Council is hereby authorized to issue and sell the general obligation bonds of the city in the sum of Seven thousand dollars (\$7,000). The funds received from the sale of said bonds shall be placed in a separate fund and shall be used for the purpose of making improvements to the streets of the city.

Section 2. The Council shall make a tax levy each year, during the time any of said bonds are outstanding, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds, and the principal thereof as it matures.
Section 3. The debt and tax limitations contained in the charter shall not apply to the bonds hereby authorized.
RESOLVED FURTHER, that for the hereinabove proposed charter amendment the following ballot title is adopted, to-wit:

CHARTER AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COMMON COUNCIL.

AN ACT
To amend the charter of the City of Heppner, Oregon, enacted by the legal voters on December 20, 1918, and to amend all acts amending said charter, by adding thereto Chapter..... authorizing the Common Council to issue general obligation bonds in the amount of \$7,000.00 to provide funds with which to make general street improvements, providing for a special tax levy to pay principal of and interest on said bonds. 100.....Yes. 101.....No.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that this resolution for proposed charter amendments submitted to the voters by the Common Council be filed with the Recorder of the City of Heppner for submission to the legal voters of said City at a special election which shall be and hereby is called to be held on the 14th day of July, 1937. The polls for the reception of ballots shall be opened at the hour of eight o'clock A. M. and closed at the hour of five o'clock P. M. on the aforesaid date, but may be closed from one P. M. until two P. M.
The following named place is hereby designated as the polling place for said election, and the following named are hereby designated and appointed as and for Judges and Clerks of election, to act at said polling place for said election on said date, to-wit:

Rolling place: Council Chambers in said City of Heppner, W. O. Bayless, Chairman, Alva W. Jones, and J. L. Yeager, Judges, and Reta Oviatt and Muriel Vaughn, Clerks.
RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Recorder be, and he is hereby instructed and required to publish the hereinabove proposed charter amendments submitted to the legal voters by the Common Council in the manner required by law; that is to say, by publishing copies of this resolution in at least two consecutive issues of Heppner Gazette Times, a newspaper published in the city within the twenty (20) days immediately preceding the said election. The Recorder shall also post notices of elec-

tion in at least six (6) public places, within the city, specifying the time and place of such election and the purpose thereof.
WHEREAS, it is necessary for the peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of the City that the election hereby called be held at as early a date as possible so that the contemplated improvements may be carried out in suitable weather. NOW THEREFORE,

AN EMERGENCY IS HEREBY DECLARED TO EXIST, and this resolution shall go into force and effect upon its adoption and approval.

Adopted by the Common Council of the City of Heppner on the 21st day of June, 1937, by the following vote: YEAS: R. B. Ferguson, E. L. Morton, P. W. Mahoney, R. C. Phelps, L. D. Tibbles and D. A. Wilson.
