Spoiled Legume Hay Valuable Fertilizer

Legume hay, such as alfalfa and clover, that has been spoiled by the recent rains may be salvaged for use as fertilizer, says Dr. W. L. Powers, gon State college. > This spoiled legume hay makes a valuable mulch, checking evaporation and loss of soil moisture, and because of its favorable nitrogen content for decomposition, does not depress growth, Dr. Powers says.
