Peck, Commissioner; L. D. Neill, Commissioner; C. W. Barlow, Clerk; C. J. D. Bauman, Sheriff; Frank C. Alfred, District Attorney.

The minutes of the February, 1938 term were read and approved.

In the Matter of Claims:
Now at this time the various claims against the County were presented and the Court approved, disapproved or continued them and ordered approved claims paid by the proper warrant from the proper funds.

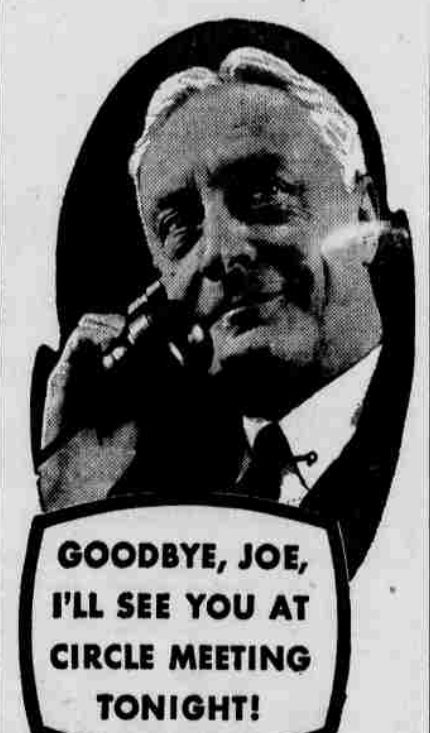
