Better Water Systems Aim Farm Campaign

A definite campaign in selected Oregon counties to assist farmers in obtaining better water supplies for the farm homes is announced by the Oregon State college extension service.

Everett Davis, extension specialist in agricultural engineering, will devote most of the summer months to this project. Extensive work will be carried on in Columbia and Wasco counties, with some follow-up work in Jackson county and probably in Josephine.

Recent reports of home betterment committees in the county outlook conferences indicated that the strongest desire on the part of homemakers for improved facilities is for running water in the houses.

Davis will conduct demonstrations of successful rural home water systems and will hold community meetings with county extension agents for those interested in making such improvements. He will also cooperate with local dealers in encouraging displays of water system equipment.

"Water system improvement may range all the way from installing a pitcher pump in the kitchen, con-

nected with a shallow well or cistern, to the development of community gravity water systems to bring water from mountain streams," says Davis.

Plans for such gravity systems are being made at present in Columbia county where he plans his first campaign. Farmers living on diked land along the Columbia river are having difficulty with water supplies, and are planning to form water associations to pipe supplies from the hills.

Air Mail Cachets Set Week May 15-21

Arrangements have been completed for Air Mail cachets to be used during National Air Mail week, May 15-21, by every post office in Oregon, it was announced today by E. T. Hedlund, Oregon state chairman for National Air Mail week.

Stamp and cover collectors throughout the United States have been advised to send their air mail stamped, and self-addressed envelopes to the postmasters in Oregon with a request for cachet and mailing during National Air Mail week. Cachets for first flight covers on May 19th will originate at Ontario, Baker, La Grande, Pendleton, Arlington, The Dalles, Lakeview, Klamath Falls, Bend, Prineville, Redmond, Medford, Grants Pass, Roseburg, Cottage Grove, Corvallis, Marshfield, Lakeside, Eugene, Albany, Salem, Silverton, Troutdale, Astoria, Tillamook, Hillsbro, Oregon City and Beaverton, terminating at Portland.
