

### Reuben Volle Dies; Was War Veteran

Funeral services were held from Laurence Case Memorial chapel in this city yesterday for Reuben W. Volle, World war veteran and for many years a resident of this city, who died at the veterans' hospital in Walla Walla Monday. Mr. Volle had undergone treatment for stomach trouble at the hospital for some time.

Alvin Kleinfeldt, Christian minister, officiated at the services which were held under auspices of Heppner Post 87, American Legion. Mrs. Russell McNeill and Charles Barlow sang, accompanied by Mrs. J. O. Turner. Thirty Heppner and Ione Legionnaires besides many other friends and relatives attended the last rites. Burial was made in the family plot in Masonic cemetery.

Reuben W. Volle was born at Albany, Oregon, Dec. 15, 1890, the son of Frederick and Victoria (Risley) Volle. Coming to Morrow county about 25 years ago, he enlisted in the army from here June 1, 1918, and served with the 63rd infantry until the time of his discharge, May 27, 1919. He married Elizabeth Gobel, March 5, 1921, and to this union three children were born, Kathleen, George and Barbara. During most of M. Volle's residence here, which lasted until about a year ago when the family moved to Walla Walla, he was engaged in ranching and lumbering. For a time he ran a sawmill with his brothers on upper Rhea creek where he also ranched. He was a member of the local American Legion post for a number of years.

Besides the widow and children he is survived by three brothers, Fred of Wheeler county, John of Irrigon and Dean of this city, and one sister, Mrs. Viola Soderstrom of Van Nuys, Cal.
