The uncollected balance was \$111,867.88. The apportionment for each tax sub-division of the county is set out in Mr. Barlow's report to the county court and is on file in his office.

Taxpayers who have land subject to foreclosure this year due to nonpayment of taxes are advised by the sheriff's office that publication of foreclosure notice will start July 21, and that they may prevent foreclosure by making necessary payments before that date.
