Riding with Helms were his two daughters, Henrietta and Harriet, and their friend, Eva Brown of Pendleton, who was going home with Henrietta to spend the week end. The injuries of Henrietta are quite serious as she was thrown through the windshield and has several deep cuts on her face and one eye was badly injured. Mr. Helms had several ribs broken and his knee and leg were injured, while Harriet was cut and her teeth were knocked loose. Eva Brown's injuries were slight. The injured people were brought to Echo and given first aid by Dr. Marbut and were then sent to the Pendleton hospital. Both cars were demolished.
