One member from each zone is elected to the county school board which has complete supervisory powers. These members are elected for terms of

from one to five years, so that each year one new member is elected, and an experienced board is maintained at all times after the organization gets under way.

Those districts where schools are maintained would still have their own advisory committees, set up as are the several district boards at present, three members in each district. These committees would have advisory powers only, to recommend improvements or changes, such as in teaching personnel, equipment, etc.
