Persons who desire to take the written and driving tests for operators' licenses are advised to watch local newspapers for announcements of visits by the state examiners, or to communicate with the nearest county sheriff or city recorder, who have copies of the examiners' schedules. Full-time offices are maintained in Portland and Salem, and resident and traveling examiners take care of the balance of the state.

Between the first of July, when 100,000 copies of a pedestrian safety pamphlet were issued by Secretary Snell's office, and November 30, pedestrian deaths in Oregon totaled 37; this compares with 54 for a similar period in 1937, and 72 in 1936.
