 Teacher Retirement Truck Supervision Tax Watchdogs By A. L. LINDBECK

Salem-Retirement pay for Oregon teachers, pensions for firemen and civil service for state employees -these are some of the new developments cropping up in the legislature during the past week.

The proposal to provide retirement pay for superannuated or incapacitated teachers springs from the Oregon state teachers' association and is sponsored before the legislature by Senator Kenin of Multnomah county. It provides for the arbitrary retirement of all public school teachers upon attaining the age of 65 years upon a pension to be supported in part by a state subsidy and in part by an assessment of four per cent upon the salaries of the teachers themselves. Retirement at an early age because of disability and upon a proportionately smaller pension is also provided for in the bill.

The firemen's pension bill which proposes to levy a tax of three per cent upon all fire insurance premiums promises to become the center of strenuous opposition with much of the support for the measure emanating from Multnomah county, whose paid firemen would be the principal beneficiaries of such a pension. Insurance companies opposing the bill point out that it would levy the tax upon all fire insurance premiums including those covering rural properties where no fire protection is provided.

The state employees civil service bill, sponsored by a group of senators and representatives, would include most state employees. Exempted from its provisions would be elected officials, appointees whose offices are created by the constitution, certain department and institution heads and members of the state police.
