Bank Adds New Finance Service

A "Doctor-Patient Finance Service" to provide money for prompt payment of doctor and dentist bills, with convenient monthly payment over a year's period, is being inaugurated this week by the Heppner branch of the First National Bank of Portland, it is announced by B. C. Pinckney, manager.

Power Company Pays County Tax

A check representing full payment of \$4352.65 of real and personal property taxes was turned over this week to Morrow county by Pacific Power & Light company.

R. P. Kinne, agent for the company, said that the total property tax paid by the company this week to 27 counties in Oregon and Washington amounted to \$451,165.29, an increase of \$10,847.47 over last year. Property taxes represent only about half of the annual tax bill paid by the company.

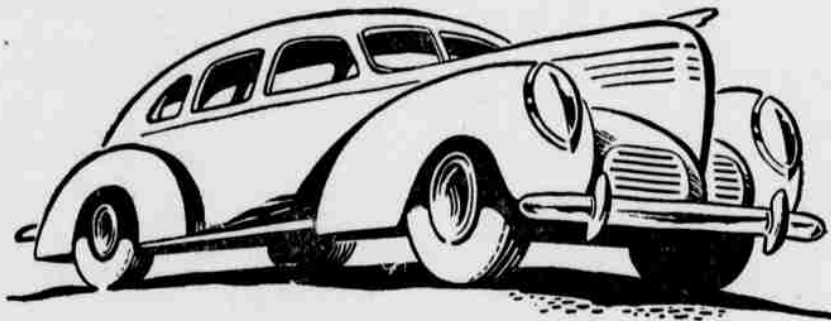
