Expansion of the army and navy recruiting quotas in the Portland area brings the new national emergency closer home to Oregon people. The quota of 60 recruits assigned the Portland naval recruiting district for the month of June has been inceased to 100. This large quota has been exceeded only once during the period since the president declared a "limited national emergency" last September. Local waiting lists have been entirely depleted and men now applying are usually accepted within 30 days from the date of application.
