### Quick Action Stops Spread of Flames

Quick action on the part of Henry Rauch and his threshing crew prevented a possible serious fire at the E. Harvey Miller farm Saturday evening when fire which started in a hen house spread through near-by weeds, threatening the recently renovated house and an adjacent grain field.

Rauch and his crew of men, at work in the Miller grain field, and men from other crews nearby rushed in and put down the flames before a great amount of damage was done. Rauch suffered injury from smoke and heat while plowing around the flames.

### COMPLETES FLIGHT TRAINING

Ted Thomson, in Heppner over the week end, said that he has completed the naval reserve aviation flight training course given at the

naval reserve air base, Sand Point, Seattle, Wash. He will now be ordered by the Bureau of Navigation to report at the naval air station at Pensacola, Florida, for the advanced flight training given by the navy, upon completion of which he will be given a commission as an ensign in the naval reserve air force and be ordered to duty with the fleet aircraft squadrons. Ted was accompanied to Heppner by his mother, Mrs. A. Q. Thomson, who had spent the past several months in San Francisco.

PROCLAMATION, WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in the judgment of the State Forester, a menace to life and property due to conditions tending to cause or allow the rapid spread of fires which might occur or because of the inaccessible character of such areas due to the lack of suitable roads, and WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following area designated as: Area No. R-1: All National Forests in Oregon except the Siuslaw National Forest, and adjacent areas protected by the United States Forest Service as follows: E½ T. 4 S., R. 27 E.; T. 4 S., Rs. 28 and 29 E.; S½ T. 5 S., R. 25 E.; S½ and NE¼ T. 5 S., R. 26 E.; T. 5 S., R. 27 E.; T. 6 S., Rs. 25 to 29 E.; T. 7 S., Rs. 26, 27, and 28 E.; all of T. 7 S., R. 29 E. north of John Day River; N½ T. 8 S., R. 25 E.; T. 8 S., R. 27 E.; N½ T. 8 S., R. 26 E. NOW, THEREFORE, I, CHARLES A. SPRAGUE, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 42-409a, Oregon Code 1935 Supplement, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described areas to be unlawful and do hereby close said areas and the same shall be subject to use only upon condition that the entrants shall comply with all of the following requirements or conditions: 1. To refrain from smoking while traveling in such areas, except on paved or surfaced highways. 2. To secure a permit issued by the forester or a fire warden before building a camp fire other than at improved, designated and posted camp grounds on such areas. 3. To have as a part of his or her equipment when using camp fires, except when traveling as a pedestrian, and-or camping at improved, designated and posted camp grounds, tools as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires. This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 1st day of July, 1940, and shall remain in full force and effect until and including the 31st day of December, 1940. Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 1st day of July, 1940. Signed, CHARLES A. SPRAGUE, Governor, ATTEST, EARL SNELL, Secretary of State.

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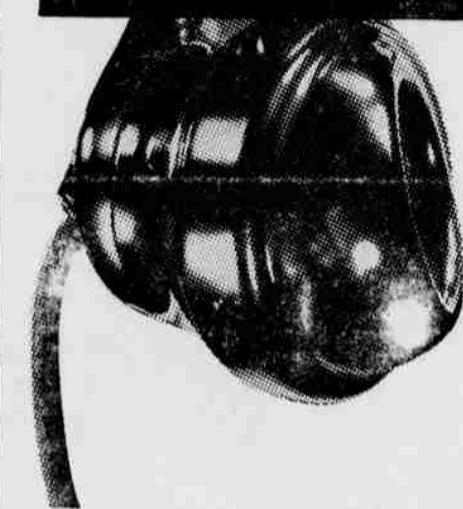
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
