Competition, always keen at the Pendleton Round-Up, will be at fever pitch at the thirty-first annual rodeo, Sept. 11, 12, 13, 14, not only for prize money but for the coveted \$5000 sterling silver Sam Jackson trophy for champion all round cowboy. The trophy must be won three times for permanent possession and no less than three top-notch performers have twice won the prize.

They're Bill McMakin, of Trail City, South Dakota, 1939 and 1937 winner, shown here with the trophy; Everett Bowman, of Hillsdale, Arizona who placed both in 1932 and 1935, and Ike Rude, of Magnum, Oklahoma, champion in 1931 and again in 1936, when he tied with Carl Arnold.

The Trophy was presented by the Portland Oregon Journal in memory of the editor, the late Sam Jackson, former Pendletonian. Competition is on a point basis, for bucking, steer roping, steer bull-dogging and calf roping, under Rodeo Association of America rules. All three cowboys are well toward the top in the R.A.A. list of high point winners at 1940 rodeos.
