Labor Mobilization Gets Under Way

More than 350,000 workers thruout the state are being given an opportunity this week to list their skills in 370 essential defense occupations.

In appeals made through representative committees in fifty communities, the Board for the Mobilization of Labor is urging that no eligible person be missed. About 15,000 employers are cooperating by keeping individual work-sheets for use in case of a defense production emergency in this area.

Early returns from the census, forms for which were mailed out last week, indicate that many thousand skilled men will be found. recently purchased and known as Tabulations will be entered soon, according to Leon S. Davis of Hillsboro, who has been placed in active charge of the survey under Director L. C. Stoll.

"After looking over the returns, I believe that in nearly every instance employers are making a whole-hearted attempt to list all skilled workers," said Mr. Davis, 'however, I urge that reports should not be concluded until every employee has had a chance to list his experience.'

Committees now are organizing; headquarters where farmers, small business men and others may register their skilled experience so as to be available for nearby defense when needed.

Approximately 10,000 tons of 20 percent superphosphate will be available for Oregon participants in the AAA program during 1941, as a result of arrangements completed by the state AAA office at Corvallis with national officials of the pro-
