

Corvallis Girl is Sixth National 4-H Club Champ

For the sixth time in 14 years, an Oregon 4-H club boy or girl has been selected to receive the Moses leadership trophy, emblematic of the highest achievement in 4-H club work in the United States. The winner of the girls' trophy, just announced at the National 4-H club congress, is Geraldine deLancey of Corvallis. In addition to the trophy awarded by H. A. Moses, she received a \$300 scholarship presented by Edward Foss Wilson at the annual banquet of the club conference December 4.

Two Moses trophies per year are awarded—one to the outstanding girl in club work in the nation. The first Oregon boy to win this distinction was Alex Cruikshank of McMinnville in 1927. Since that time the honor has been won by Edgar Grimes, Harrisburg (now commandant at Camp Heppner, CCC) 1928; Lois Bailey, Eugene, 1929; Clayton Fox, Imbler, 1936, and Helen Michael, Eugene, 1937.

Len Gilman's Record at Pacific Earns Place in American College 'Who's Who'

Len Gilman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Gilman, who will receive his B.S. degree from Pacific University in June, is among the students who will be listed in the 1939-40 issue of "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges." The book will be released in January or February.

This publication is published through the cooperation of over 500 American universities and colleges. It is the only means of national recognition for graduates which is devoid of politics, fees, and dues. Several students from accredited colleges are selected each year, by an unprejudiced committee, for their biographies to appear in "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges." These books are placed in the hands of hundreds of companies and others who annually recruit outstanding students for employment.

The purpose of "Who's Who" is to serve as an incentive for students to get the most out of their college careers; as a means of compensation to students for what they have already done; as a recommendation to the business world; and as a standard of measurement for students comparable to such agencies as Phi Beta Kappa and the Rhodes Scholarship award.

Mr. Gilman is a member of Alpha Zeta fraternity at Pacific University, was president of the sophomore class in 1938, president of the senior class in 1940, and president of the Letterman's club. He has been especially outstanding in athletics, having been chosen on the all-conference football team for four years, and receiving honorable mention on the Little All-American football team in 1938. He has made letters in football, baseball, track, and boxing. He has also served on the interfraternity council, and has held several minor fraternity offices. In 1939 he was chosen to Blue Key national honorary fraternity.

Mr. Gilman was graduated from Heppner high school in the class of 1937, and was especially active in athletics during his high school career.

Robert Zielinski, Salem, one of three national winners in the meat animal livestock contest; Mary Filiger, Astoria, one of six national winners in the girls' record contest; Dorothy Brusck, Canby, one of six national winners in the food preparation contest; Mildred Massen, Portland, one of five national winners in the canning achievement contest, and Gordon C. Decker, Portland, one of six national winners in the rural electrification contest.

All but Zielinski received \$200 scholarships given respectively by Montgomery-Ward; Servel, Inc.; the Kerr Glass company, and the Westinghouse Electric company.

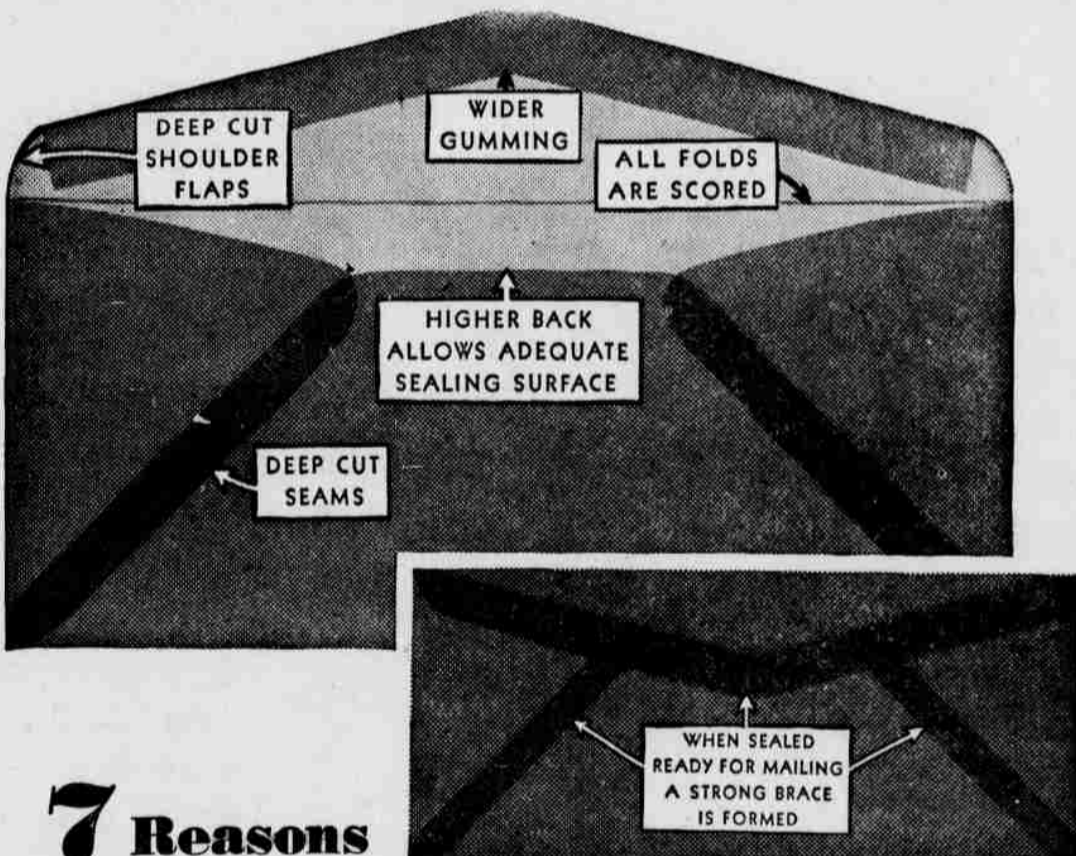
