Forage Experiment To Try Legumes, Grass

Oregon City.—An experiment in forage production believed to be unique in Oregon has been started on the new red soils experimental area in this county by the O. S. C. experiment station. A field has been laid out in checker-board fashion with strips of subterranean and white clover planted across the field in one direction. Crossing these plantings are six of the common varieties of pasture grasses, so that a half acre of each will be seeded

alone, and a half acre with the two legumes.

Standard pasture mixtures will also be planted in this manner in the spring of 1941. The experiment is expected to indicate the effects of legumes on the yield and palatability of each plot, with yields measured both by cutting and by pasturing.
