Heppner players had studied the Arlington defense and styles of play and had worked out an offense of strategy and a timing that gave them a lead in the first quarter, 10-5. They kept this lead until the last few minutes of the game when two perfect foul shots by Wetherell and a "push" shot by Ferris put the Ronkers in the lead for a win, and the large crowd went wild. Local hearts sank in the second half of the game when three top-notch regulars, Norris, Strahm and Clough went out on fouls, but it seemed only to spur the other players to fight harder.
