Mr. and Mrs. Richard Steers and son Elmer and Mrs. Max Buschke made a business trip to Arlington Monday.

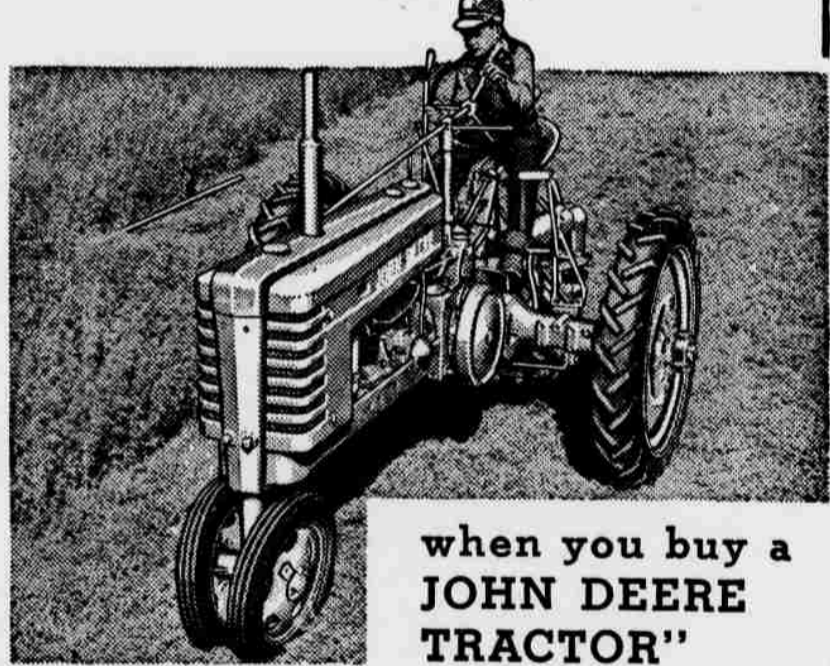

**Albany to Hold First West State Ram Sale**

Purebred sheep breeders of Linn and Benton counties, in cooperation with the Linn County Livestock association, have announced a purebred ram sale to be held at Albany in Bryant park, Friday, August 1, 1941. This is the first time that such a sale has been undertaken in western Oregon, although they have been conducted successfully for years east of the mountains.

E. F. Hubbard of Corvallis is manager of the sale, and O. E. Mikesell, county club agent of Linn county, is secretary. Extensive advance preparation is planned in order to make this one of the outstanding livestock events of the year, according to the officers in charge.

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
