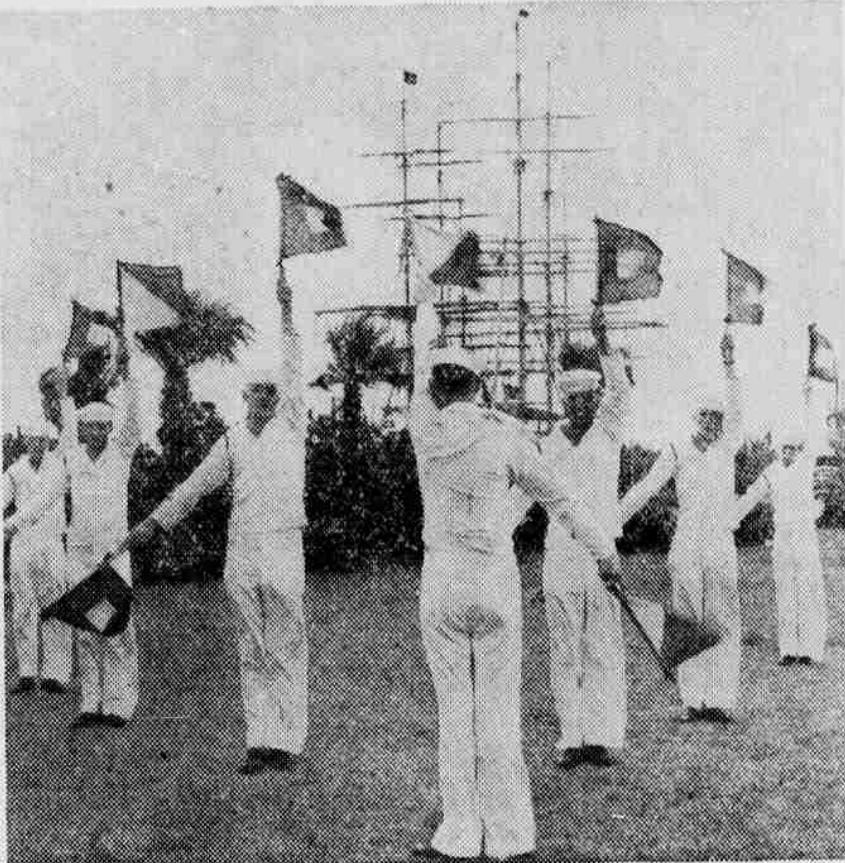

U. S. TRAINS YOUTH FOR SEA



The United States Maritime Service is meeting the threatened shortage of skilled merchant seamen by training youths who have had no previous seagoing experience.

Young American citizens in good physical condition 18 to 23 years of age are being enrolled for a seven months' course of instruction in the duties of the deck, engineers, and stewards departments. Enrollees are paid \$21.00 monthly; clothing, food and quarters are furnished by the government.

The training course qualifies these young men for jobs on American merchant vessels where pay starts at \$72.50 a month with food and quarters furnished.

Power Rate Reduction Shown in Schedule

Rounding out its latest rate reductions, which are effective today, May 22, Pacific Power & Light company filed a new power service schedule Wednesday to give substantial savings to manufacturing and industrial establishments using 30 kilowatts or more, according to K. A. House, local manager.

It is estimated that the new industrial rate will save about \$70,000 a year to Oregon and Washington customers who are affected.

Annual savings to residential, commercial and farm customers as a result of the reductions announced last month are estimated at \$410,000 for the two states.

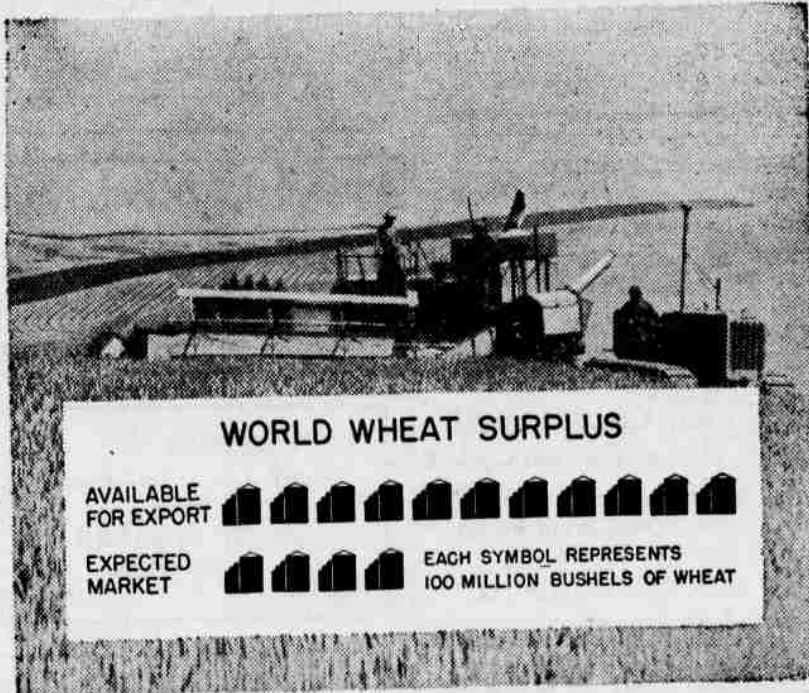
