New Referendum Slated For Heppner Soil Saving District

State Committee Says Irregularities Nullify First Vote

A number of irregularities in the May 10 vote to establish the Heppner Soil Conservation district make necessary the call for a new referendum to be held in the near future, according to official announcement received from the state soil conservation committee this week Date for the new referendum was not announced.

The proposed district would include 691,000 acres in Umatilla and i dce. Morrow counties, which if voted and approved would be subject to regulation of a state statute aimed to cooperate with the federal soil conservation service.

According to the state law, before the district can be created, at least 50 percent of the land owners and 70 percent of all the land within the area must vote in favor of the cre ation of the district. This in turn means that anyone who fails to vote at the referendum automatically votes against the district; however, it is possible for anyone who can not go to the polling places to obtain an absentee ballot and in that way be sure of voting.

Further announcement regarding the new referendum is expected from the state committee shortly.
