Funeral services for Thomas Marion Scott were held at the Christian church in Heppner on August 12, with Rev. Cecil Warner of Hermiston officiating. Mr. Scott was born near Fairfield, Missouri, on December 24, 1852, and passed away in Salem, Oregon, on August 10, 1941. In 1876 he was united in marriage with Martha Kidwell, and to the union were born Sarah Adelinc, Mary Ann, Ollie Tennessee, Laura Etta, and Henry Clay. In 1896 he joined the Holiness church, and in 1901 he brought his family to Oregon and settled near Sand Hollow. His wife passed away in 1910. He moved to Salem, Oregon, in 1911 where he spent his remaining years. In 1933 he married Mary Ingles. He is survived by his wife, Mary Scott, one daughter, Mary Tucker of Stanfield, 23 grandchildren, and 21 great-grandchildren.
