Much Wheat in State

The amount of Oregon wheat placed under federal loan so far this year is already double the total amount for the entire year of 1940, the state AAA office announced.

Two thousand loans, totaling \$6,-742,499 on 7,235,219 bushels of wheat, have been reported up to September 15 as approved by the Commodity Credit corporation. 
