Women in Defense' Move Brought Home

Taking inventory of the women of the United States because of acuteness of the defense need and because of the fact that the United States is technically at war even though no declaration of war has been officially made, was incentive for a meeting at La Grande Monday at which Lucy E. Rodgers, county school superintendent, was made in the union to make a survey of sub-chairman for Morrow county. The meeting was addressed by Sadie Orr Dunbar, Oregon chairman recently appointed by Governor Sprague, and Mr. Hindman of Washington, D. C., from the office of production management.




