## Forest Service Seeks Protective Assistance

"Because of labor shortage, the forest service does not want to interfere with farms, but every source of aid must be drawn on for fire protection the coming season," announces F. F. Wehmeyer, ranger in charge of the local district. He said the service is seeking cooperation from everyone. He warned that no fires this season will be treated as "accidental" if man-caused, and that all such fires will be considered as sabotage. All forest areas will be placed on restricted basis with start of the fire season, and no one will be allowed to enter without permit.

Edgar Parker has been temporarily transferred from the local office to work timber sales in the Mt. Emily district. Ellis Carlson has arrived back in Heppner to resume his work as protective assistant and is stationed at Tupper. Elmer Hinton, Max Buschke, Bert Bleakman and Carlson are now at Tupper to start spring maintenance work. Merle Crawford, formerly in charge of the state forest area in this district has been moved to Sisters, and Dick Berry has succeeded him with headquarters at Kinzua.

Wehmeyer said no shortage in irrigation water should be experienced this year. Moisture content of snow on Jones prairie as of April 1 measured 12 and a fraction inches, as compared with two and a fraction last year, and three and a fraction two years ago at the same time.

## Farmers Exhaust FSA Loan Funds

Heavy demands of family-type, small and part-time farmers in Oregon for equipment, livestock, feed seed and cooperative credit to produce increased war foods and meet their war board pledges has exhausted current Farm Security Administration loan funds, announces Bruce E. Stewart, county FSA supervisor, Heppner Hotel building.

"While all-out 'Food-for-Freedom' cooperation of Morrow county and Oregon farm families unable to secure other production credit has been amply demonstrated, rush of farmers to do their part has exhausted funds set up for the present fiscal year ending June 30, 1942," Stewart said. "As a result, new Farm Security loans cannot be made until congressional action has been completed on appropriations for the new fiscal year beginning July 1, 1942."

Indicative of the all-out "Food for Freedom" efforts of local farmers is the fact that food production loans totaling \$33,000 have been made this year to 40 farm families, which includes 14 special war loans to small and part-time farm families for production of food for home use and market, reports Stewart.

"Although additional FSA funds are not expected to be available prior to July 1, loan applications can still be accepted for immediate action when appropriations are completed," Stewart said. "In the meantime, every effort will be made to aid FSA borrowers in carrying out their Food for Freedom plans into actual production in cooperation with the county war board."

## 'Booster' Solution for Victory Gardens Told

Barnyard manure placed in barrels or other watertight containers and then covered with water will provide a source of liquid "booster" solutions highly valuable in growing farm and home gardens, points out C. D. Conrad, county agent of Morrow county.

Some care is necessary in handling, however, to prevent damage from too strong concentrations. Only enough material should be put in a barrel so that it may be stirred several times over a period of one or two days. After that the liquid is diluted with additional water until it has a light amber color, when it is safe to use.

A pint of this liquid per plant when transplanting will serve as a booster solution, or it may be poured along the side of growing plants to stimulate more rapid growth. For this purpose it may be used at intervals of 10 days to two weeks on growing plants with great benefit, particularly if soils are not very fertile. Leafy vegetables are especially benefitted from its use.

In some respects these liquid fertilizers made from barnyard manure are more valuable in promoting growth than are some of the chem-

ical fertilizers, although many of the latter may be used to good advantage.

Various formulas for starter or booster solutions are in successful use, points out Conrad. They are widely used in transplanting tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, celery, and even with melons. It is important that chemical fertilizers used in such solutions be carefully weighed. When made up by guess, the solutions may be in such proportions as to damage plants or do them little good.

One starter or booster solution made from commercial fertilizers and quite commonly used is made as follows: 20 ounces of 11-48-0 ammoniated phosphate, 10 ounces nitrate of potash, if obtainable (or 10 ounces of sulphate of potash) to 50 gallons of water.
