Ken Warner, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Warner of Lexington, now with the Royal Canadian Air force in England, wrote interestingly in a letter received this week by his former teacher, Mrs. Lilian Turner. He writes:

Dear Mrs. Turner:

Thank you for writing. I really appreciated your letter very much. And please forgive me for my tardiness in answering. There are two things which make writing to you rather difficult—the censorship over here, that leaves so little of interest; and my memory of your own cen-

sorship. You used to completely cover my literary efforts with great red check-marks, caustic remarks, etc. Now, after such a long time from your teaching, I shall probably get an absolute zero for my pains.

Since you read my first letter home, you may also have seen the last one. If so you must overlook the repetition.

The most disheartening news is that I am in for a good deal of unexpected training. The period of transition from the training schools of Canada to active duty with the R.A.F. has been lengthened from two to something like five months. So far I have completed only one month of that.

At the present I am on a flying station in the heart of a farming country so green and beautiful that it surpasses all imagination. One of the local inhabitants assured me quite solemnly that cattle brought here from other counties of England always starved to death. It seems that they walk through this remarkably green grass without recognizing it, eat down the bordering hedges, then slowly waste away. The story may or may not be true, but does serve to illustrate my point.

My most prized possession of the moment is a rusty, squeaky, old bicycle. We have to cover great distances in a day's routine, so nearly every one of us owns one. In the evenings we go for long rides around the country—over narrow winding roads through farm yards, great country estates and sleepy old villages. Sometimes we cycle twelve miles to see a picture show. One night recently I saw a Bob Hope show. It was like seeing an old friend.

Part of our station is on the grounds of a large estate. On it there is a great mansion hundreds of years old, surrounded by acres of gardens. The English go in for gardens very whole-heartedly (trees, flowers, fountains, statues, benches, and all that sort of thing), and I must say that I approve of the idea. There are even more picturesque than the average, and I sometimes spend whole evenings roaming thru them.

From my letters you may get the idea that this doesn't seem much like a country at war. That is entirely true if one ignores the hundreds of aerodromes and army camps and stays away from the cities. I find the bombed cities very depressing and prefer to write about something more cheerful—even at the risk of seeming to be continually harping on the same subject.

I played my first game of cricket today. Cricket, you know, is the national sport of England. It seems to be a very slow game after our football, baseball, and basketball. It has been played for years, so it will always be played, I suppose. Anything that smacks of tradition goes on forever here. One of the most famous cricketers in England is a man named Warner. He would have been very disappointed if he could have seen me performing today.

Please don't be too critical when you start grading my work. I know that changing the colour of my ink in the middle of the letter was not the correct thing to do. And please don't wait so long before answering as I have. Letters from home are quite a thrill to me.
