**One War Week**

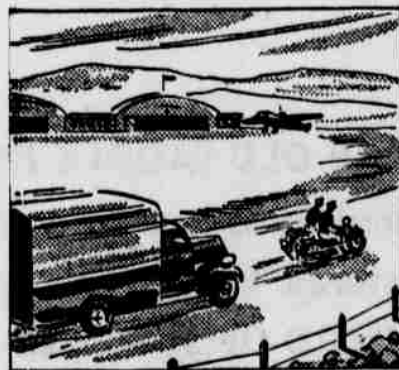
A calendar of events on one war job in one recent week gives a graphic picture of how General Electric is working to meet wartime emergencies.
