CIVILIAN SERVICE MANUAL NOW OBTAINABLE

Questions that are being asked daily by thousands of Oregonians interested in the war effort are now answered in a new manual of Civilian War Services released this week by the Oregon State Defense council, under the direction of Mrs. E. W. St. Pierre, state director of civilian war services.

This manual enables local defense council to tell each of us how we can become a small fighting unit on the biggest front of all—the home front. It answers the questions "How can I get into this war?" "What can I do?" It is a call to arms for every person in the State of Oregon who has one hour to spare from the activities necessary to maintain his livelihood.

Thousands of volunteer workers in Oregon will be greatly interested in this manual because among the many war service activities explained are the block plan, rationing, consumer interests, transportation, defense housing, labor supply and training, child welfare and others.

The state of Oregon has accepted all programs recognized by the national office of civilian defense which can be directed and carried out by volunteer workers. The segregation of these responsibilities and tasks has been made by state officials into programs best suited to local conditions, and the specific activities of each of these services has been carefully detailed in this new civilian war service manual which is now being distributed to the various agencies of each county defense council in Oregon. Any organization interested in securing a copy of this manual may do so by writing the Oregon State Defense Council in Salem, or going to the offices of the county defense council.

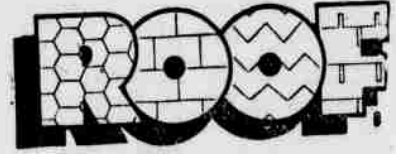
HERE FROM PORTLAND
