County Receives Power Company Check

A check in payment of 1942-43 real and personal property taxes assessed at \$2896.27 on Pacific Power & Light company property will be turned over to Morrow county this week-end, according to Kenneth A. House, local manager for the company here. Total of such taxes on the company's properties in Oregon, due at this time under the state's new fiscal year, is a little over \$226,000, House said.

While this total is slightly less than the amount paid by the company last year, House said that rapidly mounting federal taxes will boost the company's total direct tax bill for the year to a new all-time high estimated at \$1,185,000, more than 12 percent above the record-breaking tax bill paid last year.

In the next quarter, the Mustangs were again in scoring position but were held for downs; then Grant took over. They put on a power drive in the last of the quarter that put them on the two-yard line, first and goal to go. With only time for one play left before the half, they attempted a line smash that put them on the one-foot line, but the half time gun went off.

There was no more scoring until early in the final quarter when the Mustangs drove to the Prospectors' three-yard line. Buknum hit the middle of the line for a score. The conversion failed.

The Grant High team had a line of over 170 pounds. Aided by a powerful and fast backfield, they were hard to stop when they got rolling. The Heppner line stopped them but only by playing over their heads. Several linemen played very well. Among them were Cohn, who played his best game of the year; Parrish, who played his usual good game, and McLaughlin who also showed up well.

In the backfield, Bothwell shone offensively, playing his best game of the season. Bucknum, new fullback, showed lots of drive, and quarterback Kenny threw some nice passes for considerable yardage. Nearly all of the yardage for the Mustangs was made by the "B" boys, Bothwell, Barratt and Bucknum.

Outstanding for Grant were Henshaw, fullback, who is rated as one of the best fullbacks in eastern Oregon; and McGinnis, halfback on the offensive, while Captain Church, end, was outstanding defensively.

Heppner's victorious Mustangs who Wednesday upset the driving Hermiston Bulldogs, will meet the Condon Blue Devils who defeated Arlington, claimant to the central Oregon "B" league championship, at 2:30, Saturday on the home field.

The Blue Devil challengers, the powerful team that defeated Arlington, 13-7, and tied Grant High 6-6, will seek vengeance for their 39-0 defeat last year. The undefeated Mustangs although badly battered as a result of the Hermiston battle, will try to uphold their claim on the mythical central and eastern Oregon "B" league championship.

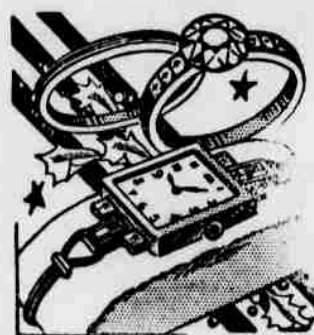

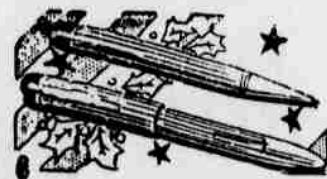
