### TAGGING EWES ADVISED WELL AHEAD OF LAMBING

With lambing time in some parts of the state only a few weeks away, good operators are tagging their ewes at this season. This consists of removing the dirty wool from the rear portions of the sheep and all wool around the udder. Ewes so treated have less trouble at lambing time, and lambs can nurse with less difficulty, according to OSC livestock specialists.

Tagging also improves the fleece at shearing time. If tagging is postponed too long there is danger to the ewe from rough handling.

### Heppner Student at OSC Rates Who's Who

William F. Barratt, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Barratt, Heppner, who will receive his B. S. degree from Oregon State college in June, is among those students who will be listed in the 1942-43 issue of "Who's Who Among College Students in American Universities and Colleges." The book will be released in January or February.

This publication is published through the cooperation of over 600 American universities and colleges. It is the only means of national recognition for graduates which is devoid of politics, fees and dues. Several students from accredited colleges are selected each year, by an unprejudiced committee, for their biographies to appear in "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities." These books are placed in the hands of hundreds of companies and others who annually recruit outstanding students for employment.

The purpose of "Who's Who" is to serve as an incentive for students to get the most out of their college careers; as a means of compensation to students for what they have already done; as a recommendation to the business world; and as a standard of measurement for students.

Mr. Barratt is president of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity at Oregon State college, secretary-treasurer of Blue Key honorary, member of Alpha Zeta and Interfraternity council, senior manager of the Oregon State football team, president of the Oregon State's Manager's association, etc.
