Mrs. America Meets the War

The distribution of war ration book two sometime early in 1943 will introduce Mrs. America to a new form of rationing. This system known as point rationing will be different than the present form of coupon rationing used for coffee and sugar. As the name implies, scarce but essential goods will be rationed by points. Those within one group will have different values, according to relative scarcity. For example, tenderloin steak might require more coupons because of a higher point value. On the other hand, hamburger being more available would have a lower point value. The number on each stamp will tell how many points it is worth, and it also will bear the date during which it will be valid.

War babies layettes will not be minus waterproof crib sheeting or rubber panties despite the rubber shortage. The substitute material may not be just the same, however, waterproof goods are made from ordinary cotton fabrics coated with plastics, synthetic resins and other cleaned with warm water and compounds. The fabrics can be mild soap, but they should not be wrung or twisted in any way. And, incidentally, those products are price controlled.

When fruits and vegetables canned during 1943 start showing up on your grocer's shelves, you may expect them to be uniformly labeled according to grade, regardless of the packer. This requisite by office of price administration reveals a trend to include information on quality in price orders wherever possible. It is expected that dollars and cents maximum ceiling prices will be set for canned goods following the standardized grade labeling. And in that way a woman will be able to refer to specific prices instead of having to remember back to a distant base period. About half of the 1943 pack of fruits, vegetables and juices has been earmarked for the armed forces and lend-lease, but most of these will not be consumed until 1944.

If you've been unable to secure think about the shortage of chicle, chewing gum as readily as usual one of its most important ingredients. Chicle is the coagulated sap of a tall tropical evergreen tree, the Spondias, which grows wild in the jungles of Mexico, Guatemala, British Honduras and Venezuela. It takes 30 years before a tree produces chicle and then it should be tapped only once in six seasons. But the main difficulty is that shipping space is scarce on ships for the importation of chicle. And then perhaps there is an increase of stenographers chewing gum or consumer demand is greatly increased, and there are large purchases of gum by our armed forces. This year's output almost equals the 1941 record of 15 billion sticks of gum chewed.

Mrs. America's junior may not always be able to get his favorite candy bar. And that's because chocolate soldiers are in the war too—providing nourishment to the armed forces in the Solomons, in Africa or Australia. Normally, America's sweet tooth demands for chocolate bars reaches 400 million pounds. Of course, this year much of this poundage will be diverted to soldier boys. The soldier's emergency food package, ration D, contains hard chocolate and sugar, and candy makers also supply the concentrated ration K.

Mrs. America's 1943 Easter outfit should not cost her more than it did last season. The OPA provided this safeguard despite increased labor and materials costs by setting manufacturer's ceiling prices for all women's, girls' and children's garments manufactured after Dec.

15. Before the garments go on the market next spring and summer retailers' and wholesalers' maximum prices will be set. And it is intended that spring and summer clothing be almost equal in quality and workmanship to that of last season.

Yes, we may have no bananas, but we do have a reduction in prices charged by importers and wholesalers. And there still is no encouragement that there will be any increase in the limited supply reaching our shores.

FARM TRACTORS IN WARTIME

Simple Adjustments Pep Up Tractors (Third of a Series of Six Articles)

Last week's article told how the farmer can practice preventive maintenance on his tractor, thus effectively stopping trouble before it starts. But there is another side to tractor care also, a side that too often is neglected. Tractors are getting harder usage than ever these days, with the struggle to keep up with the increasing demand for agricultural products, and this hard usage causes engine

parts to get out of adjustment more frequently than before. Usually, however, the changes are effected so gradually that they pass unnoticed until they become large enough to cause engine failure or a substantial reduction in power delivered by the tractor.

Every farmer can take steps to prevent such failure or power losses, merely by making it a practice to tune up the engine regularly. First on the tune-up list should be the carburetor adjustment. This should always be done when the engine is thoroughly warmed up, and is operating on the belt at normal load. Simply turn down the needle valve until the engine misses and backfires. Then turn the valve back about a quarter of a turn until the engine runs smoothly. This is a correct position for most efficient operation.

Spark plugs are the next thing that should be looked at on regular tune-up occasions. They should all be removed and the insulators cleaned thoroughly, after which the gaps should be reset to the correct spacing and the plugs replaced snugly in their holes. Be sure, of course, that you are using the type of plug required by your tractor; when operating on gasoline the plugs should be of the cold type, while tractor engines burning distillate or kerosene must be equipped with hot plugs.

The governor on your tractor is the device that keeps the engine operating at a constant speed which is most efficient for the work

to be done. With this device out of adjustment, the engine speed will vary and power loss will result. When tuning up the engine, check the engine speed with a speed counter on the belt pulley; if the speed is not what it should be, or varies considerably, the governor itself should be checked for wear and for reduced tension on the spring. This trouble, when encountered, should be repaired immediately in order to preserve maximum engine efficiency.

If the valves on your tractor engine are not working properly, there will be another loss of power. Make sure that the tappet clearance is not too small or too great, by checking with a feeler when the engine is at operating temperature. If the valves are held open by insufficient clearance, the valves and seats will be burned; if there is too much clearance, the valves will not open all the way and insufficient fuel will be drawn into the cylinders. In either case power will be lost, and in the first case the valves and seats will soon be badly damaged.

Last but by no means least is the question of ignition timing. This is a rather delicate job, and should only be attempted if you have available the complete instructions in the manufacturer's manual. If not, better have a service man do the work. In any event, however, you should always include a check of ignition wires and connections in your tune-up.

A recent survey showed that a large percentage of farm tractors are working below peak efficiency, some of them wasting as much as 20 percent of the fuel used, all for the want of a simple tune up, a job that can be quickly done in the manner outlined above.
