Mrs. Blake Laid to Rest Thursday

Funeral services for Mrs. Willard J. Blake, whose death occurred Tuesday morning, Jan. 26, were held Thursday, Jan. 28, at the Ione Cooperative church. Rev. J. Fred Stilwell officiating and services in charge of the Ione chapter of the Eastern Star, of which the deceased had long been a member.

Anna Lucinda Miller was born Feb. 15, 1873, at Fort Scott, Kan. She came to Morrow county in February 1892, from Bourbon county, Kan., and taught school several years in the Eight Mile section. She married Willard Josiah Blake Dec. 25, 1894. To this union were born four sons, all of whom with the father survive—Willard Ray of Moro; Mearl Miller of Portland; Kenneth Kilmer of Heppner and Tedford W. of Ione. Other survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Mary Blake of Ione and Mrs. James Gulick of Grants Pass, and three brothers, Edward Miller, Portland; Robert Miller, Los Angeles, Calif. and Willard Miller of Putnam, Nev.

Mrs. Blake was one of the first worthy matrons of the Eastern Star lodge in Morrow county. Active in religious affairs, she was president of the Ladies Cooperative Aid society. She lived continuously in Morrow county for more than 50 years.
