RATION BOOK NO. 2

June 6—Red stamps L valid; M, June 13; N, June 20. All, including J and K, expire June 30. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

June 7—Blue stamps G, H, and J valid through this date. Blue stamps K, L, and M good through July 7.

SUGAR
August 15—Stomp No. 13, book No. 1, good for five pounds, expires at midnight. Stamps No. 15 and No. 16 in war ration book one valid for 5 pounds of sugar each for home canning.

June 30—Stamp No. 24, book No. 1, good for one pound expires at midnight.

SHOES
June 15—Stamp No. 17, book 1, valid for one pair, expires at midnight. Stamp No. 18, valid June 16 for one pair. Stamps interchangeable among family.

FUEL OIL
Sept. 30—Period 5 coupons valid March 26 through Sept. 30. Heating coupons—one unit, value 10 gallons; ten units, 100 gallons.

GASOLINE
July 21—"A" books expire. No. 6 stamps in "A" books valid through this date.

TIRES
Cars with B books must have tires inspected every 4 months; cars with C books, every 3 months. Cars with A books, every 6 months.

FUEL OIL
Sept. 30—Period 5 coupons valid March 26 through Sept. 30. Heating coupons—one unit, value 10 gallons; 10 units, 100 gallons.

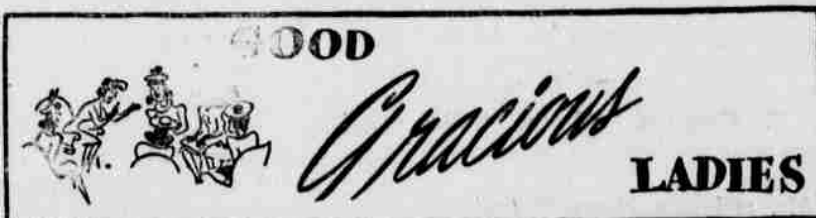

It can be utterly delicious if carefully made and flavored discreetly with black pepper and nutmeg and garnished with the riced yolks of hard-boiled eggs. With this serve olives, still ration-free, cole slaw and dark bread which you spread with butter you have stretched by beating in cream a little at a time. Beer is the ideal beverage for this combination and saves your precious tea and coffee. Have a cola drink for the children.

We're getting down to simplicities all right. But war time entertaining like this can be as much fun as any party you ever gave. Just try it and see!
