Denton, found little meaning in civilian life after the death of her husband, she said. Seeking a more active part in the war effort, she joined the WAC and is now in basic training at First WAC training center, Fort Des Moines, Ia.

There are three other reasons why Private Wesch wants to work toward victory. The first is her brother, Sgt. Le Moin E. Cox of the U. S. Marine Corps, who saw action as a paratrooper on Gulutu, one of the Solomon Islands. He was wounded and sent back to this country for hospital treatment. Upon his release from the hospital he was named a Marine gunner.

A second brother, Nalbro B. Cox, who is also a Marine sergeant, was sent to Midway before war began and was transferred to Pearl Harbor just in time for the Dec. 7, 1941, attack. (News of Nalbro's death had not reached the mainland prior to the sending of this news letter.—Ed. note).

Lyle Cox, her third brother, is a machinist's mate with the United States navy air force.

Private Wesch is the daughter of Clarence M. Scrivner, 507 Laughlin St., The Dalles, Ore., and of Mrs. Oma J. Cox, Heppner, Ore.

## GREEN FEED VITAL PART LAYING HEN RATION

Green feed has long been recognized as a valuable part of poultry rations and is one of the most practical ways to conserve feed, says Noel L. Bennion, extension poultryman at Oregon State college. The amount of feed required to produce a dozen eggs can be reduced from 10 to 20 percent if an adequate supply is available.

Alfalfa is the most universal source of green feed, he says. Most poultry mashes contain from 5 to 10 percent alfalfa meal. In addition to the mash five or six pounds of succulent green feed or root crops such as carrots or mangels fed daily for each 100 laying hens is a valuable supplement to the ration. Young succulent greens feeds are palatable and are a good source of proteins, minerals and especially vitamins.
