Protective Society Appeals for Funds

An appeal for funds to carry on a work that has merited support for 36 years is being made in Morrow county this week by Mrs. Harriett Smith in behalf of the Oregon Protective Society, perhaps better known as the Louis Home and Albertina Kerr Nursery of Portland.

The society was started in 1907 by Mr. and Mrs. W. G. McLaren. When returns from their restaurant were not sufficient, Mr. McLaren went out all over the state appealing to business men, farmers, clubs and churches for support. Today the society has property worth over \$300,000, owned by the people of Oregon. Over 8,000 cases have been cared for. The society now has a beautiful school (private); the only venereal hospital for juveniles in the state—50 beds; two girls' homes—50 beds, and a nursery with 70 beds. Cared for 424 wards from 29 counties in 1942 and adopted 29 babies in the same year.

"We are appealing directly to friends we miss in our visit over the state and to farmers whom we are unable to contact personally, for financial help this year. This is our hardest year. We have state aid, community chest, county court and some paid cases. The cost of operations this year will be \$90,000, \$10,000 of which we are asked to raise outside of Multnomah county. Please help us if you can, and many thanks," Mrs. Smith concluded.

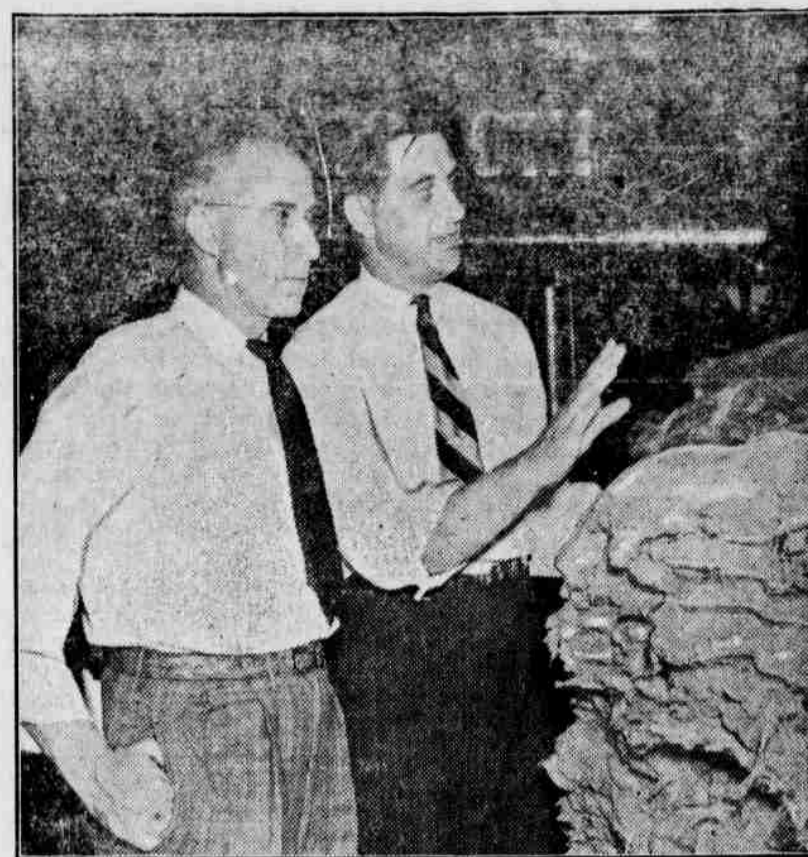
