LEMON MILK SHERBET 1 envelope plain gelatin

4 cups milk

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 1-3 cups granulated sugar

3/4 cup lemon juice 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Soak gelatin in one half cup of the milk in a bowl for five minminutes. Then set bowl over boiling water and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Combine rest of the ingredients wth the remaining milk Stir in gelatin. Turn into freezing tray and freeze until set, without stirring. Serves 5 or 6.


