DOGS MANIFEST KEEN INTEREST IN TRAINING FOR ARMY SERVICE

There are many training camps over the country but it is doubtful if any of them offer more of interest than one located at Rimini, Mont. It is smaller in population than the average training camp and its personnel consists of a thousand or more dogs ranging in size from giant Newfoundlands to the average run of ranch canines. The "bow-wow" division or corps is being schooled in the art of feeling out the enemy, or perhaps it is proper to say scenting, (since much of their work will be done in ferreting out the Japs), to serve as pack animals in difficult terrain, for dog trains, for rescue work and many other tasks that will lighten the burden of the fighting man.

Residents of Rimini and surrounding country never tire of watching the dogs go through their daily routine, states Mrs. Rose Wilson, who is visiting at the home of her son, L. E. Dick. Trainers are service men who love dogs but who must deal firmly with the faithful little animals to instill discipline. The hills surrounding Rimini provide training ground for the several types of activities the dogs will engage in at the front. One of these is transportation involving several dogs to the vehicle. Whatever the type of vehicle, it is pulled by an odd number as there is a leader for each group.

Civilian dog lovers frequently protest against the harsh treatment accorded their canine friends by their young trainers but this does not alter the program. If the dog is preparing to go to war he must be hardened to its unyielding cruelty the same as the human soldier.
