Hyslop Agricultural Research Memorial committee, has been invited to a state wide organization luncheon in Portland April 6 when the drive for the memorial will be formally launched. No solicitation will be made at the luncheon, it is stated by Dr. D. D. Hill, secretary of the state committee and successor to Professor Hyslop. Governor Snell and other state and civic officials have assured the committee they will attend and participate in the organization work.
