### GARDEN PESTS AND HOW TO KILL THEM

CROP & INSECT	TYPE OF INJURY	WHAT, WHEN AND HOW TO DUST
<b>SWEET CORN</b> European Corn Borer	Bores into Ears and Stalks	When tassels first appear, destroy worms by hand-picking. Spray young tassels with Rotenone-mineral oil mixture.
Corn Earworm	Eats Kernels	
<b>TOMATOES</b> Fruitworm	Bores into fruit	
Flea Beetle	Small round holes in foliage	Just with Rotenone-Lethane and arsenate or Crvolite every 7 days. Apply to both sides of leaves. Wrap stems of plants with paper for protection against cut worms
Horn Worm	Eats foliage	
Aphids	Suck plant juices	
Cut Worm	Cuts and Eats off Stem just above ground	
<b>POTATOES</b> Colorado Potato Beetle	Strips plant of foliage	Apply Rotenone-Lethane dust every 6 days. Dust both surfaces of foliage carefully.
Aphids	Suck plant juices	
Potato Leaf-hopper	Sucks plant juices	
<b>BEANS</b> Mexican Bean Beetle	Chews plant foliage	Apply Rotenone-Lethane dust when bean plants first appear and repeat every 5 days. Dust both surfaces of foliage carefully.
Bean Leaf Beetle	Eats round holes and roots	
Bean Leafhopper	Sucks plant juices	
<b>PEAS</b> Pea Aphid	Sucks plant juices	Apply Rotenone-Lethane dust. Repeat every 5 days.
<b>CABBAGE</b> Cabbage Worms	Outer leaves riddled by large irregular holes	Apply Rotenone-Lethane dust when plants are set out. Repeat at 5-10 day intervals.
Aphids	Suck plant juices	

These leading garden pests will soon be destroying precious bean, pea, tomato and potato plants unless Victory Gardeners study up on insect killing poisons. The war has drastically cut supplies of rotenone—the grower's most trusted insect killer—and this year's supply will fall far short of essential needs. Garden experts warn that only by using the new synthetics will growers be able to wipe out threatening insect infestations.

State Experiment Stations report that one new synthetic, known as Lethane and developed by Rohm & Haas Company, Philadelphia chemical manufacturers will fill the gap caused by the acute rotenone shortage and give gardeners an insecticide as deadly to garden pests as straight rotenone dusts. Garden experts are advising vegetable growers to consult local seed men and dust mixers for specific Lethane-Rotenone mixtures best adapted to local weather and soil conditions.
