## Power Company to Pay Rate Dividend

Another 'rate dividend' totaling \$300,000 will be received by customers of Pacific Power & Light company about the end of September giving them the equivalent of one month's free service in 1944.

Announcement of the 'dividend' was made following a meeting of the company's board of directors in Yakima, at which the payment was authorized.

Like a similar payment made to electric users last May, the latest 'dividend' will amount to approximately one-half of a typical monthly bill. It will be paid by checks mailed to each customer.

The two rate dividends will mean total savings of \$600,000 in electric bills of Pacific Power & Light company customers in 1944, and will be equivalent to an 8.3 percent rate

reduction.

This method of sharing wartime earnings with customers was initiated in the Pacific Northwest by the P. P. & L. company last spring with the approval of the Washington Department of Public Service and the Oregon Public Utilities commissioner.

### CELEBRATE BIRTHDAYS

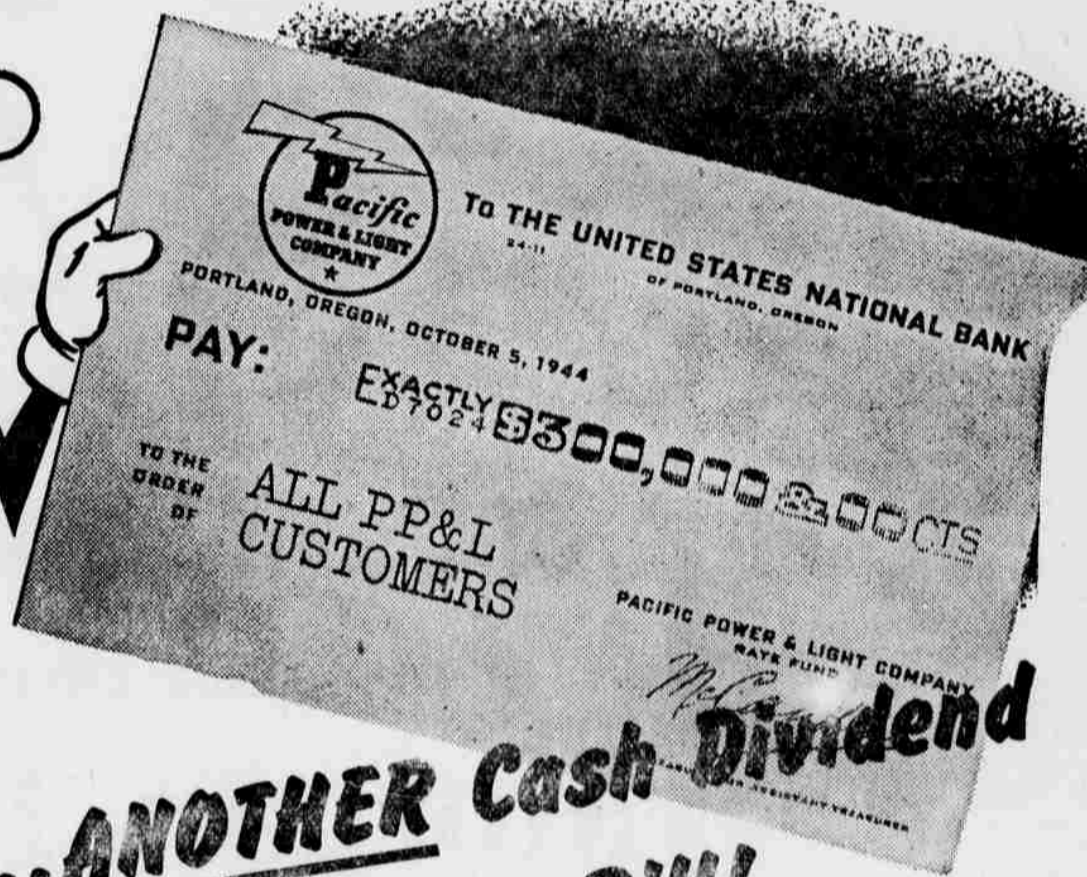
