The importance of grocers fully understanding the aims and purposes of OPA is amply demonstrated by a letter written by W. Curt Miller, secretary of the Fresno, Calif., Retail Grocers association, part of which is quoted.

"It is the grocer's job to see to it that government programs, price regulations and food conservation are carried out in even the smallest communities. That is a job and admittedly no one grocer can do it by himself. But today, as always, the grocer maintains a relationship to the men, women and children of his neighborhood which is a potent influence on the community's public opinion. He can instill into hundreds of thousands of minds abhorrence of black markets which threaten the country's economic structure in critical wartime. He can arouse the spirit of

cooperation on the part of consumers in all wartime programs. By his own example he can encourage civic pride."—OPA News Letter.
